CINCINNATI, Dec. 11.—James Morgan, who has charge of the east-elevator of the custom house has been literally scared to death. **Relics of the Mound Builders.**

CHILLICOTHE, O., Dec. 12.—The members of the World's Fair archeological expedition, which for the past six months has been excavating the Indian mounds in this vicinity, yesterday came across the richest find they have yet discovered. It was a collection of copper ornaments and utensils, consisting

of 120 pieces, wrought into all manner of beautiful forms. There are anklets, bracelets and earrings and thin sheets of metal representing perfectly the form of the common Scioto River sucker. But the strangest of all are two pieces made exactly in the shape of the watiska, or cross of the Greek church. This is the first watiska found in North America. The ornamentation of the whole collection is plainly of Mexican or Peruvian design and this corroborates the theory previously formed that Ohio Mound Builders were closely allied to the Aztecs. The collection is valued by Messrs. Morehead and Cresson, the chiefs of the expedition, at not less than \$3,000.

**FOR "THE HERMITAGE."**

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 12.—The Ladies' Hermitage Association, a national organization devoted to the work of restoring the Hermitage, the home of "Old Hickory," is actively engaged in the effort of raising money for the restoration fund. To aid them in this work, Mr. Flagler, the millionaire capitalist, has tendered the association the use of the Ponce de Leon Hotel at St. Augustine, Fla., for a grand Jacksonian historic costume reception to be given February 3 under the auspices and for the benefit of the association. Patrons will be appointed in all the leading cities, and Mrs. Harrison has given her consent to become one of the patronesses. Mrs. Levi P. Morton has already sent a handsome contribution of money to be added to the association's fund. It is anticipated that the Jacksonian reception will be one of the grandest events of the kind ever given in this country.
