The Biggest Fee for Legal Advice.

MURRY.—Testified that his residence is on Malheur river about 30 miles south of Westfall post office in Malheur county; been there 18 months; resided in Harney county prior to going to Malheur county; left Harney county on the first day of May 1890; family consisted of wife and four children; took wife and children when moved into Malheur county; did not know whether he would make his home in Malheur county or not; had no fixed residence in any other county except Malheur at that time; resided in Malheur county on the 2nd day of June 1890; was in Drewsey on the 2nd day of June 1890; voted in said place for the town of Harney for permanent county seat.
