A WARNING to the good Odd Fellow or the A. O. U. The report of J. W. Mack, surveyor of Grant county, who recently surveyed twenty mining claims on Trout creek, is very encouraging indeed.

Mr. Mack says: "did I own any of the claims which I surveyed, I would not think of taking \$10,000 for it." The streak of pay dirt in the gulch is from 10 to 40 feet wide and in depth from 5 to 10 feet, and very rich. One nugget weighing \$6, and many other fine specimens have been obtained by the miners. Some pans only reach 10 cents, while others positively reach \$1; out of 15 pans which was washed in the space of a half hour, \$6 was cleaned up. The water supply if properly utilized will last three months and in that time a great deal of gold can be taken out. The outlook for Harney county mines is certainly very favorable and we prophesy a big rush to them in the spring.

We believe we can safely promise the seeker of wealth, who contemplates coming here in the spring to prospect our mines rich returns for his work.

Indeed there can be no doubt of the fact of our mountains being abundantly impregnated with gold and silver waiting to be unearthed by the miner thereby spreading joy and happiness over our county. As the little girl said when she fell down and was picked up crying by a bystander with the remark, "poor little girl, I hope you are not hurt?" she replied: "I ain't poor neither! dad's struck it." That will soon be the exclamation of our people.

## NEWS IN GENERAL

FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD

### BLAINE'S BOMB.

Significant Step of the Secretary That Forebodes an Almost Certain Clash in the Cabinet.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—To say that there is music in the air in Washington is absurdly understating the situation. There is a Wagner opera afloat, or at least the overture of one. There is also a tangled web of intrigue which may soon be unraveled. Keen observers would not be surprised to see an open split in the Cabinet before the week is out, with Blaine turning his lance against the Administration from the vantage ground of private life. The press associations to-night are sending to every town in America an interview with Mr. Blount of Georgia, chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee of the House, upon the subject of the Chilean answer to the ultimatum of the United States.

Blaine has been standing alone against the President and all the rest of the Cabinet in favoring peace with Chile. He regards the Chilean offers of reparation as thoroughly satisfactory and says so. Knowing that the President had determined to crowd Chile to the wall, did he think it a good time to put the spoke of public opinion in the wheel of war? If so, he went about his work in the most effective possible way. Mr. Sherman, of course being a friend of Harrison, and not particularly partial to Blaine's Presidential aspirations, did not feel under any obligations to assist the Secretary in embarrassing the President, and so he kept the secret of the Chilean surrender locked up in his own bosom.

But now, Mr. Blount, who was one of the strongest opponents of the Breckenridge resolution, says to personal friends that he believes the Chilean answer was in the possession of our Government by 11 o'clock Monday morning—nearly two hours before the President's message was delivered to Congress. The message, it may be as well to recall, ended with these words: "I have as yet received no reply to our note of the 21st instant, but in my opinion I ought not to delay longer to bring these matters to the attention of Congress for such action as may be deemed appropriate."

The Chilean crisis has now given place to a crisis in the Administration. There may be a few fire eaters who would like to trample on an infant republic begging for mercy, but they do not control the Fifty-second Congress, and the House will not stop until it has sifted all of the rumors of the hour to the bottom.

The Foreign Affairs Committee will meet to-morrow prepared to establish the truth whoever may suffer. There is reason to believe that certain revelations may be submitted to the committee which will put the course of the Administration in a light that will shock the American people. To-morrow will tell. But it is certain to-night that the President and his Cabinet—all but one—are unhappy. Mr. Blaine, however, is said to be elated.

### FREAK OF A DRUNKEN MAN.

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—From ten to fifteen locomotives, for which there is no room in the round house, stand every day on the Erie railway tracks, near Henderson street crossing, Jersey City.

The afternoon there was one locomotive west of the crossing, and a dozen or more on the other side. The engineer and fireman of the one standing alone had left it temporarily. A drunken man climbed into the cab, pulled open the throttle, and the locomotive started back.

Employers shouted to the man at the throttle, but he simply laughed, and gave the handle another jerk. The men on the other locomotives were unable to get out of the way. The moving locomotive ran about two hundred yards, and crushed into the nearest locomotive. This started the second one, and it in turn crashed into the one next behind it. In a minute and a half four or five locomotives were all jammed up together. An engineer jumped on the first locomotive, hurled the drunken man to one side and turned off the steam.

The drunken man, who was arrested, gave his name as Charles Porter. He said he was employed as a brakeman on the road. The damage amounted to several hundred dollars.
