FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD

East Oregonian: At the request of Judge Clifford Judge Fee has ordered a stay of execution in the Zorn case, pending the decision of the supreme court upon the appeal to that body.

Zorn's neck is thus saved for a time at least, which is doubtless gratifying to the prisoner, as the necktie party was on program for Friday, March 25th.

If the supreme court affirming the verdict in the lower court Zorne will be re-sentenced at the next term of the circuit court in Umatilla county, which convenes June 6th next. This will postpone the hanging until some time in July. If the supreme court decides the appeal to be well grounded, the case will come up at the June term for a new trial.

Zorne has some friends on the outside, as is evidence by the appeal, and also by the petition asking that his sentence be commuted to imprisonment for life, which if this influence will be sufficient to prevent him from being launched into eternity to meet the avenging spirits of his wife and mother-in-law, remains to be seen.

SAN ANTONIO, March 25—A most remarkable case came up before County Judge McAlister her today.

It was the examination as to the sanity of a young woman named Mary Haywood, who has been living in the woods near Steding in this county, like a wild animal for the past six years, and during all that time has never slept under a roof. She wore dress made of reeds and leaves and has lived for the most part on the pecan nut although she would make frequent nocturnal raids on smokehouses and steal salted meats, which she discovered and devoured without cooking. She would never permit any one to come near her, and the people of that section bore her presence until her thymic operations became so active that they captured her through strategy. Nothing is known of her early history. She was pronounced of unsound mind by jury today and will be committed to the asylum.

John M. Morgan and wife lived in Benton county about twelve years and raised a family. They were quite well known and highly respected, but married life was a failure in this case, and a divorce was applied for and granted. This was several years ago, and Mrs. Morgan was allowed \$8000 for the support of herself and family. Since then it has been feared that Mr. Morgan is very wealthy, and in the settlement with his wife induced her, by fraudulent representation, to sign a deed conveying her interest in the community property, valued at \$300,000. Mrs. Morgan is now a resident of Colfax, Wash., and her former liege lord lives in Spokane. She has just begun an action to set aside the decree of the court and ask that she be given her rightful share of his possessions.
