Run Over by a Train.

ALBANY, Or., April 27—As the overland south bound train last night was approaching the station of Tangent, seven miles south of here, a man was seen standing close beside the track. He did not get out of the way, and was struck and killed by the engine. The engineer thought the man got in the way of the engine purposely, with suicidal intent, but later indications show that he probably intended to board the train. He was struck by the guard rail of the engine on the left side of the head, breaking his skull and killing him instantly. His body was brought to the city this morning. Letters upon his person showed his name to be W. D. Bauff, and that he has a family in Victoria, Tenn. A telegram notifying them of the accident has been sent. The unfortunate man was a member of the order of Knights of Pythias, by which order he will be buried here, unless directions to the contrary are received from the family. He was clean shaven, moderately well dressed, and did not seem to be a tramp, although he had no money.—Times-Mirror


