THE OREGON PACIFIC.

The Oregon Pacific outlook is good. Yesterday in the United States district court in the case of Lindley Smith et al against T. Egerton Hogg on the motion to issue a restraining injunction, the court rendered a decree that the plaintiffs must accept the proposition for a stipulation as given below, of the defendants within ten days or the bill will be dismissed and the injunction denied. The defendants also will be required to sign and accept the stipulation embraced in the proposition, or the motion to enjoin will be allowed under the order of the court.

On suggestion of counsel, the court modified the stipulation so as to require that the temporary lien shall be removed within two years, and that the plaintiffs shall not be required to guarantee against any other litigation, except on the part of these plaintiffs, or the committee of reorganization, or any portion of them. Following is the substance of the stipulation:

That in consideration of the Farmers Loan and Trust Company refraining from moving to set aside the sale, which it now stipulates to do, and in further consideration of the dismissal on May 2, 1892, of the Lindley Smith suit with the consent of the plaintiffs therein, and the withdrawal and termination of all litigation, it is agreed that the defendant will be allowed to hypothecate lands necessary to provide the money to required to complete the purchase, \$1,000,000, and to pay all claims existing against the property at the time of its conveyance to the new company, including the expense connected with the sale and reorganization, together with interest thereon from the time the same is paid, the said job or said new company to be at liberty to hypothecate the said property as security for such additional sum as may, in the opinion of a majority of the reorganization committee, with the concurrence of the directors of the new company, be advisable for the purpose of paying any amount equitably due, forming a lien on any property of the company, purchasing steamships and other necessary equipments, and extending railroad this additional sum, however, not to exceed \$2,000,000; and that said property shall be released from the lien of any such hypothecation as soon as a sufficient sum for that purpose can be obtained from the contemplated issue of bonds as provided by the terms of the reorganization agreement under the first mortgage for \$18,000,000 and the second income mortgage for \$10,000,000.—Albany Democrat.

From parties who have been in the city since the decision rendered by Judge Deady in the Oregon Pacific case, say that by this decision the Oregon Pacific people will be able to put the road across the Cascade mountains into the great wheat belt of Eastern Oregon. It will be the means of giving employ-

ment to several hundred men with a monthly output of thousands of dollars. There is no question now but what the road will be completed to some trans continental line in the near future.—Gazette.
