Yesterday Rev. Sam Driver swore warrants in Justice Bentley's court for the arrest of the Ashworths, Hansen and Saylor, and an unstable Aowed, accompanied by deputy Sheriff Kinnison, went to their homes and arrested the quartette. They will have a hearing this morning.

It is the general verdict of all witnesses of the row that the participants should be dealt with severely and Justice Bentley will be doing only his duty if he fines each of every one of them heavily. It is time that a stop be put to the doings of such worthless ruffians. Now is the time to start it. —Baker Democrat.

The above disgraceful row occurred in "God's country" in the heart of civilization and under the immediate drippings of the holy temple. STARTLING DEVELOPEMENTS are coming from Salem out of the arrest of the fiend Wilson, which the report says promises to clear up one of the most profound murder mysteries in the history of Oregon, and proves as innocent a gray haired man who is now serving a life sentence in the Oregon state penitentiary. This old man is William Scott, who stands convicted of the murder of his aged life-partner near Heatland two years ago. Yesterday Scott was walking past Wilson's cell, when Wilson asked the guard if that was not Scott. The guard asked Wilson what he knew about Scott, and the reply was that

he knew a great deal. He said he would tell all he knew about it in a day or so. Scott has already denied murdering his wife, claiming that he saw a man run from the house into the orchard when he heard the report of the gun that killed her. Wilson intimates that he knows all about her murder. It will be remembered the place where Wilson escaped from the officers was within half a mile of the scene of the Scott murder, and when he passed Scott's house he asked if that was not the Scott place. Wilson said the officers were drinking heavily, or he would not have escaped so easily.

Over on the blooming Rosebud the weather has been real cold lately. On a recent trip with the mail, Frank McBean saw fields of frozen grain hay—or rather grain that had been sown for hay. But bunchgrass in that mountain valley does not freeze so easy, and cattle are all fat.—Canyon News.

TOWN ORDINANCE No. 26.

Be it ordained by the town of Burns, Harney county, Oregon, by her duly elected council that the following Ordinance for the government of said town is hereby enacted.

It shall be the duty of all persons owning land on second street in the town of Burns, Harney county, Oregon, upon notice of the street commissioner to build or cause to be built, a side walk in front of his or her lot or lots. Said side walk shall be eight feet wide with two inch lumber with three stringers four by six, and shall be built in a good and workman like manner and shall be on the line of the street; said side walk shall be of a uniform height along each block, and in case any person or persons fail to build such side walk within thirty days from the date of notice of the street commissioner it shall be the duty of the street commissioner to proceed to build such side walk and such work shall be deemed to have been done at the request of the owner or lawful possessor thereof and the same shall be done at the expense of the owner and in case such person or persons fail or neglect to pay for such work then the town of Burns shall have redress by an action at law for double the amount expended in building such walk or walks.
