Confident of New York.

LOGANSPORT [Ind.],—Sept. 12.—S. P. Sheerin, Secretary of the Democratic National Committee, arrived at his home here today after an absence of three weeks in New York, attending to his duties at the headquarters of the committee.

"What do you think about the Democratic situation in New York?" he was asked.

"I believe we will carry New York. All differences between the party leaders there have been adjusted to the entire satisfaction of everybody, and they are all working and pulling together with an eye single to victory in November."

"What is Tammany doing?"

"Most effective work; in fact, the party's interest in New York city is almost entirely in the keeping of Tammany. I never saw men more intelligently alive and zealous for party success than the workers of the Tammany organization in New York are at this time."

"What about the New York State Committee, what are they doing?"

"They have started upon their campaign work and are getting things in elegant shape. Governor Sheehan is the Chairman of the Executive Committee and a very bright active fellow he is. He has the situation in the several counties of the State at his finger ends."

"What about Governor Hill?"

"Governor Hill will be in the canvass as he always has been, and within the next ten days he will make the greatest speech of his life."

"How does Mr. Cleveland feel about his prospects?"

"Quite confident, but at the same time he realizes that there is a necessity, as there always is, for active and intelligent work. I saw him Friday last when he was in New York. He takes a very active interest in all the details of the campaign."—Examiner.

Claiming Its Victims.

SPRINGFIELD [O.], September 10.—A special from Zanesville says: Not the least interesting feature of the great Sullivan-Corbett battle is the train of tragic events which has followed its wake. One man has gone crazy over the result and several have lost their lives through fights growing out of the result. One of the saddest incidents connected with the event was the death of Lawrence Barton, a bright boy of eleven, as a result of injuries sustained in a fight with John Mitchell, aged ten. The two little fellows were interested in the Sullivan-Corbett fight and were indulging in amateur matches with all their little companions. They would get up mills among themselves, gravely arranging a ring and gong by rounds. Finally a championship mill was arranged between little Barton and Mitchell. Barton represented Sullivan and Mitchell Corbett. They had several rounds and several blows were exchanged. Finally little Barton threw up his hands with a cry of pain after a particularly severe blow on the back. He

was picked up and taken home and died in an hour. His spine was found to have been injured. Mitchell was arrested for assault with intent to kill.

Gov. Boies on the Stump.

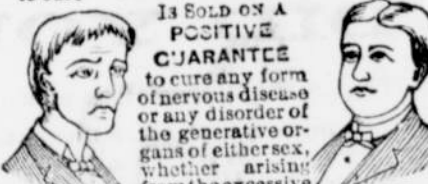
CARROL, Ia., Sept. 15.—Governor Horace Boies opened the campaign by a stirring speech in this city today in the presence of thousands of enthusiastic democrats. In his speech he declared this to be the most important campaign of recent years. The tariff question was the great issue, and the time for the farmers to demand surcease from unjust, unequal and excessive taxation had arrived. He made an exhaustive tariff argument, producing statistical proof of his remarkable statement of two years ago that, estimating farm wages at the same rate as city wages, the Iowa crops had sold for 67 cents per acre less than it costs to produce them. Governor Boies also discussed the force bill, currency and other planks of the national platform, as well as denouncing the present prohibition law in Iowa.
