Local News.

—The improvements being made on the French hotel are about completed.

Mrs. Harrison's Condition.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Dr. Gardner visited the bedside of Mrs. Harrison this morning, and afterward said to an Associated Press correspondent that it was merely a question of time, but whether an hour or days can only be determined by events. It is said the disease is now making rapid progress in the left lung and the patient is growing weaker. There is a weaker pulse, feeble respiration temperature 103, coughing spells more frequent, followed by periods of great exhaustion, from which she rallies with extreme difficulty. She was wakeful and very nervous during a greater part of the night, but seemed a trifle more comfortable this morning.
