COUNTY SEAT.

Judge Shattuck Decision in the County Seat Contest.

[CONTINUED FROM EDITORIAL PAGE]

9 That in Burns precinct polling place No 2 there were eleven votes cast on the question of location of permanent county seat of said Harney county, and it is shown by the evidence that they were all cast in favor of the town of Burns as such county seat.

10 That a small number of legal votes cast in Harney County at said election for the location of county seat was 956 and that of this number the town of Burns received 481 legal votes and all other places which were voted for as such county seat received 475 legal votes, and that the town of Burns received a majority of six of all the legal votes cast at said election in said Harney County upon the question of location of permanent county seat.

In consideration of the premises it is found as a conclusion of law that the plaintiff is not entitled to the relief sought by the writ of mandamus herein but that said relief should be denied and said writ dismissed, and it is so ordered and adjudged, and that Defendants have and recover from Plaintiff the cost and disbursements herein taxed at and have execution therefor.

Goer, the aforesaid \$800.49 or action will be taken at the next regular term of the county court to recover the same. In the matter of creating a building fund for the erection of county buildings.

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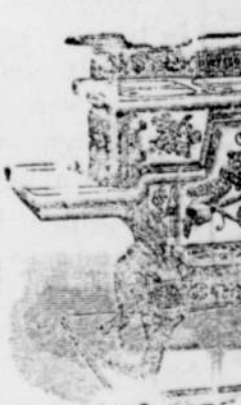
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
