County Court convened Wednesday, Jan. 4.

In the matter of the Anderson Valley and Juniper road, reported O. K. and road ordered opened.

In the matter of the Island and Potter Cove road, reported O. K. and road ordered opened.

In the matter of a petition of G. W. Hayes et al requesting appointment of H. R. McClure as constable for Harney District, petition granted.

In the matter of the publication of county court proceedings, the EAST OREGON HERALD selected.

In the matter of the road supervisors' reports; examined and approved.

In the matter of appointment of stock inspector, David Carey appointed.

D. W. Claypool declared a county charge.

In the matter of appointing road supervisors: Dist. No. 1, Geo. H. Williams; No. 2, John Witzli; No. 3, Chas. Zeigler; No. 4, James Dalton; No. 5, J. I. Cross; No. 6, C. E. McKaney; No. 7, J. W. Buchanan; No. 8, J. W. McMullin; No. 9, E. Olsen; No. 10, Frank Gilder; No. 12, O. W. Porter; No. 13, Simon Lewis; No. 14, Bart Cronin.

Road District, No. 13, now comprises all of Lake, Diamond and Catlow precincts and all of Happy Valley precinct west of the divide between Anderson Valley and Happy Valley.

Road District No. 7 and 11 made one No. 7.

Additional bond of \$10,000 required of Sheriff as tax collector.

The boardmen of Thos. Roberts ex county Treasurer, ordered to pay into the county treasury on or before the next regular session of the county court the balance due the county and not accounted for.
