Mexico's Revolution.

RIO GRANDE CITY, Tex., Jan. 2.—There is no longer any doubt that the present movement is going to continue to grow in size and importance until the Mexican government will find it exceedingly difficult to overcome it. This place is in the very center of the revolutionary sentiment, and there are not half a dozen Mexicans or Americans here, exclusive of the troops, who are not secretly in sympathy with the movement. The fact that the reserve roster of the so-called army of Catalina Garza, which was captured by Captain John C. Bourke several months ago, had upon it the names of 80 men of Rio Grande City, who could be depended upon to join in the revolution when the proper time arrived, shows the existing feeling. It is the same way throughout Starr, Zapata, Hidalgo, Nuevo, and Webb counties, and is estimated that there are fully 8000 Mexicans on this side of the border who are giving the active instigators of the present revolution every secret assistance in their power. This fact accounts, in a large measure, for the difficulty which the United States troops meet in trailing the bandits on this side. The opinion is general here that it will be only a short time until the plans of the revolutionary leaders have been sufficiently matured to make a bold and united invasion of Mexico. There are already several detachments of revolutionists on soil and they are gathering large numbers of recruits from all parts of Mexico, particularly in Nuevo Leon and Tamaulipas. The fact that General Estrada, one of the most efficient commanders in the Mexican army, has deserted and joined the revolutionists has had a decidedly stimulating effect upon the cause.

Political Notes.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—Chairman Harritt has been in the city for the past two days. While here he has seen a good many gentlemen with whom he was brought to close relations during the recent campaign. He had a long interview with Cleveland at his office in the Mills building, and discussed the political situation with him. Ever since it became apparent that there would be contests in some of the Western states over a control of the legislature and election of senators, Harritt has been giving special attention to the matter, and was able to report progress favorably to the president-elect and his other friends. All his advices indicate that the senators from Wyoming, Montana and California will certainly be democrats, they giving the democrats 44 senators, which, with the casting vote of the vice-president,

will enable them to organize that body when it meets in March.

Little Queen Isabella may open the world's fair in May along with President Cleveland. Such is a possibility, but whether it can be called a probability depends upon the sanction of the Spanish government. There would be something wonderfully pleasing if the Infanta could take part in the ceremonies. Four hundred years ago another Queen Isabella was the only one to give encouragement and lend a sincere ear to the ambitious Columbus. He appealed to many another monarch, but in vain. To her he told his story in earnest, convincing words. To her he pictured this new world he would discover, and won her favor.

To a woman's aid of this genius then is America largely indebted, and now it would indeed be becoming to have the beautiful little queen participate in the impressive exercises which shall open the grandest exposition in the annals of time and in a nation whose existence in all its glory to day is largely due to the cooperation of the brave Columbus and the kind queen, whose name she bears four centuries later.

Carlisle for the Cabinet.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—The statement was put in circulation yesterday to the effect that Carlisle, preparatory to entering Cleveland's cabinet, had prepared his resignation from the senate, to take effect February 14. Senator Carlisle said today, with much emphasis and no little irritation, that there was absolutely no truth in the report. He added: "I have not resigned and I can't say whether I will resign or not. As a matter of fact, I have not made up my mind." Senator Carlisle's friends here and in Kentucky are doing their utmost to induce him to accept the president's offer. They go so far as to say that if he were to leave the senate to accept a portfolio he might safely count on being returned to the senate at the close of the administration. Those who know Carlisle best declare that if he were to leave the senate he would not allow his successor to be hampered by any such conditions.

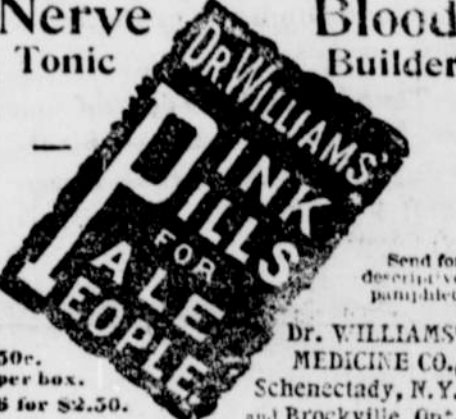
The Populists Break Faith.
