Senate Bill No. 50.

Introduced by Mr. Cross, and read first time January 11, 1893.

For an Act to change, in part, the compensation, and mode of payment thereof, to the Clerk of the Supreme Court, County Clerks, Recorders of Conveyances, Clerks of the Circuit Court and County Courts in the State, and of the Sheriffs of the several counties; to repeal certain provisions of Statute, providing for the payment of certain fees to said officers, and of trial fees in certain cases; to provide for the payment of certain fees to parties to appeals, actions, suits and proceedings of certain sums to assist the State and the several counties in defraying expenses consequent upon the administration of justice; to provide for the appointment of deputies for the various offices above enumerated in certain cases, and for their compensation; and for the payment to the State and several counties of sums of money and fees paid to officers by parties litigant.

Destitution on the Eastern Shore.

OLD POINT COMFORT, Va., Jan. 24.—Two negro oyster dredgers arrived here from Tangier island today, and reported that they walked 34 miles on the ice from where their boat was frozen up to reach Cape Charles. They say there were 20 in the party, white and colored, and seven of them dropped on the ice and were, they supposed, frozen to death. Two of these, they say, were white drummers who had gone out to the dredges to sell goods. They say there is great destitution off Tangier island, and that people are starving. Cattle have been killed for food, but there is no bread to eat with the meat. A person arriving here from across the bay stated that there are 4000 oystermen on the eastern shore of Maryland and Virginia who are out of work and dependent upon charity. They have done no work for over a month, and there is much suffering among them. Half starved and half frozen ducks and geese are driven ashore in large numbers at Virginia beach, and can be killed by the barrel with little effort.

Prohibition of the liquor traffic is coming at a constantly accelerating speed. It will take most men by surprise. It is only a question of united work on the line of determined, virtuous, aggressive action of a political character, and success is sure in the near future.—From "Editorial Fla-hes," in Demorest's Family Magazine for February.
