

They say there 10 90 were 20 in the party, white and colored, and seven of them dropped 158 80 on the ice and were, they suppossed, frozen to death. Two of these. they say, were white drummers who had gone out to the dredges to sell goods. They say there is great destitution off Tangier island, and that people are starving. Cattle have been killed for food, but there is no bread to eat with the meat. A person arriving here from across the bay stated that Carnenter & Joiner. there are 4000 oystersmen on the eastern shore of Maryland and Vir- Burns ginra who are out of work and dependent upon charity. They have done no work for over a month, smithshop. 13 00 and there is much suffering among them. Half starved and half frozen ducks and geese are driven 39 20 ashore in large numbers at Virginia beach, and can be killed by the barrel with little effort.
