ED HERALD: I have just returned from a trip of three weeks duration. The time was spent in the Silver Lake country, where I had the pleasure of meeting a few of the old pioneers of Lake county, as well as many relatives. It was quite pleasant to live over again the by gone days of '73, in our conversation and thoughts. We numbered at that time 18 of which only 5 now remain. The advanced condition of the country at this time, was entirely beyond our conception in those early days and I feel safe in predicting, with my knowledge of Eastern Oregon, that when we get a railroad through Harney and Lake counties, the rapid settlement and increased wealth of this country will astonish old settlers. Men are riding over lands to day unnoticed that will then be converted into good homes by thrifty settlers, and these lands will be worth dollars then, which are considered almost valueless at this time. Many persons here are selling their rights and improvements for a mere song which, in my opinion, they will have cause to regret in the near future. We have experienced a few very cold days here, snow fell to the depth of ten inches at Silver and Sommer lakes, and the thermometer got as low as 18° below zero, at Paisley we had 8 inches of snow, and the thermometer 8 below.

The poodles party make a little noise, here, occasionally, but their efforts are very feeble. I have many objections to this party, one is it is run by a set of men out of business, lawyers without clients, Drs. without patients, women wanting husbands, aspirants for office that want a job, and preachers without hearers. 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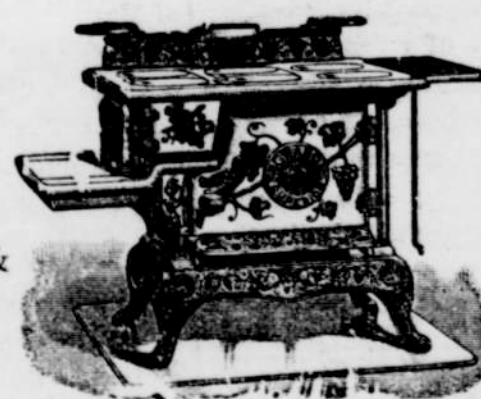
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
