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Ontario-Burns Mail.

Again the people along this line are without mail. Mr Lavaff, agent for the contractors, came to the Burns Postoffice April 23d, and demanded the mail, which was refused, for the reason that it was considered proper performance of the service could not be rendered, as the contractors had insufficient stock, no money or credit, in this country, and, that as at present, the temporary contractor was giving good service, in justice to the people no change should be made. The contractor secured possession of the line from Ontario to Beulah and there is where the service is not being performed. The stages run as far as Westfall, there stop leaving a break in the line of 36 miles, with no early prospect of a change for the better. We are informed reliably that the contractors are endeavoring to carry the mail with only half the stock necessary, feeding only hay, and that the horses are literally worn out and unable to make time. The people along the line will give them no credit, consequently everything is at a standstill. The Postoffice Department at Washington has been appealed to by petition time and again to give us relief but a deaf ear has been ever turned, and it seems that the interest of 4,000 American citizens is a matter of no concern with the officials who have charge of the contract division of the Second Assistant Postmaster General. Mr. Vaughn, Deputy Postmaster at Burns, returned from Drewsey yesterday, where he had been looking after the mail service and reports that Mr. Dan Lavery promised to go to Westfall and bring the accumulated mail to Drewsey, and if he has done so we will have mail today. Mr. Vaughn brought back three through pouches which left Burns, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, and the mail was forwarded via Canyon City yesterday. He also brought a large amount of registered matter from Drewsey and Harney. Until the Ontario line is straightened out, if it ever is, all mail from Burns intended for the railway points will be sent over the Canyon City line.
