Local News.

—An attempt was made to assassinate President Machado, of Nicaragua on the 9th inst. two or three persons were killed and several wounded, but the President escaped unhurt.

—Miss Lizzie Borden, indicted for the murder of her father and mother, in Bedford Mass., is again on trial in the court room. Save her sister no woman has called on or visited the poor girl or sent her a bunch of flowers. There is no positive evidence that she committed the crime, the evidence being wholly circumstantial. Was it a man similarly situated his cell would be strewn with flowers and more women praying for admittance than could possibly gain an entrance.

—Ford's old opera house, in Washington City, in which President Lincoln was assassinated, collapsed on the 9th inst. There were 400 government clerks in the building at the time and it is supposed at least 25 lives lost, and none to escape without injury. Full particulars of the accident have not yet reached here. A strange coincidence is that the building should collapse on the day that Edwin Booth, the brother of the man who assassinated Lincoln, was buried.

—The A. O. U. W. lodge of Burns, while in a healthy condition, still the want of interest and non attendance of its members living near and many reside here in town is greatly to be deplored. This organization is the poor man's friend, when a member dies his beneficiary is paid promptly with out delay or red tape, his family immediately receives help and support. The society or order was instituted for the express purpose of benefiting the poor laboring class, and when we pay a dollar benefit we know we are doing a charitable deed, for that dollar does not go in to the coffers of some rich corporation or individual, but goes directly to help clothe, feed and support a widow and her children or some one worthy. Now we want to know why it is that so few members in our lodge take so little interest and never or seldom appear at the lodge. It is actually frequently the case that the M. W. at the hour set for opening the lodge will not have a quorum and will himself start out and visit the different places of resort in town and beg of the members—whom he generally finds playing cards or billiards—their presence in the lodge room long enough to go through the business of the evening. We not only call such negligence on the part of the members shameful, but we say further they are not worthy and steps should be taken for their expulsion and cancelling their beneficiary certificate.

If a man or men is so far lost to the social, polite and refined qualities or instinct that distinguishes a man from a brute and a gentleman from a savage, he does not deserve our friendship and good will, consequently is not worthy to be a brother workman. If a man is so selfish as just to pay his dues for fear of expulsion and throw the whole responsibility of the organi-

zation upon the shoulders of others, and so selfish as to consult his own pleasure and convenience in the matter, such an individual is not worthy to be called brother or the satisfaction, when on his death-bed, of knowing that his family will receive \$2,000 benefit from the lodge. We say it is the duty of members of all lodges where the good of our fellowmen is taught and the welfare of mankind advanced, to attend at all times, unless something of some importance prevents.

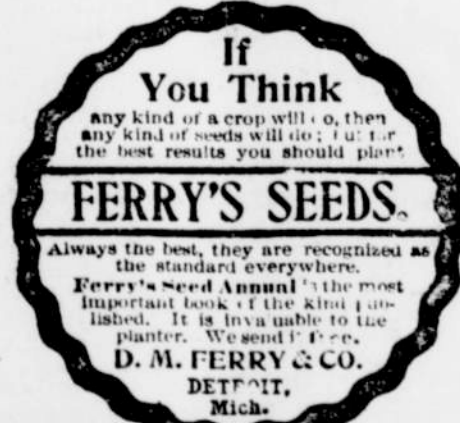
