make an effort to get it. Shortly
before the robbery Reiter suggested
that they had better take John A.
Crisman along, that he was a good
man, and that he had been out
with him before. This was agreed.
The parties met on Long Creek
mountain and from there proceeded
to the store, stopping occasionally
to take a drink. Mr. Allen was
called by Reiter on the pretense
that he wanted something to eat.
Allen opened the store door and was
met by Reiter with pointed revolver
and ordered to hold up his hands.
Allen did not take the matter in
earnest at first, and began scuffling
with Reiter backing him up against
the counter. More at this stage of
the game stepped into the store and
ordered Allen to throw up his
hands, which he did and after un-
locking the safe suffered himself
to be tied. The parties under ar-
rest for the robbery are, John A.
Crisman, Ralph Reiter and Wm.
Moore.

methods, under the supervision of

lerville, Pa., State Normal, has
been added to the department for
the next years work.
