Tuition.

Some parties, living in the country and paying school tax in the district in which they reside, desirous of sending one or more of their children to our school [we mean the Burns school] object seriously to paying tuition. It has not been the custom heretofore to charge tuition, but the school board see proper at this time to charge out siders a small amount of tuition. Those parties who live in the country think it unjust because of the advantage, they argue, it is to the business of the place, in the way of renting dwelling houses or paying board also an advantage and a big one, to our merchants. Further it gives our school and town a boon, encouraging immigrants to settle in our county and town and, in fact, declare that we do our town an injury by charging tuition for scholars from other districts. This line of argument on the part of the said parties, is all very good, but the board of directors say there is always two sides to a question, and people living in other districts only see their own side and do not consider what is really the duty of the directors, of this district or town school.
The board says it takes money to run a school and while allowing the country people free access to the school, is certainly an advantage to them, and having parties from the country move to town during the winter term of school is money to the business portion of our citizens, still if the school receives no tuition for such pupils it is no money to the school. The school fund is not increased one dollar, but by charging a tuition we will have more money in the treasury, consequently can have longer terms of school, pay better wages for teachers, thereby secure the more competent instructors, which

of course is better for the country people sending their children here, because they enjoy this advantage the same as our own children. In conclusion we do not think it is right or justice to our town board to be censured for doing what they think is a matter of justice to the district and school. If it is a matter of injustice to neighbors and can be so shown to our board of directors we know the mistake will be immediately corrected.
