County Court Proceedings.

V. S. Outmer received the con-
tract for furnishing the county
wood, 20 cord, at 3.45. The bids
were as follows, J. I. Adams \$4 per
cord, J. Durkheimer \$4, C. M. Mc-
Pheters \$4.75. The court ordered
\$320 expended on the Anderson
Valley and Juniper road.

In the matter of sealed propos-
als for artesian water. One sealed
bid received and rejected, being
in excess of what the county court
felt able to expend for that pur-
pose. But it was ordered that the
county clerk communicate
with Geo. W. Kellogg of Salt Lake
to the effect that the court will al-
low said Kellogg reasonable ex-
penses not to exceed \$100 to come
to this county and personally ex-
amine look over the ground and
make proposals for boring an ar-
tesian well. The county contract
for keeping the poor was relet to
Lytle Howard. The cost is \$3.97
per capita a week. The bids were
as follows: J. P. Dickenson \$4.49
J. C. Wooley \$4.40, Mrs. L. A.
Dickenson \$4.19, Price Withers
\$4.25.

Sheriff's bills continued for the
term.
Road Supervisors O. W. Porter
and Simon Lewis were ordered to
expend \$200 each in improving the
road known as the Saddle Butte
Narrows road.

I. S. Geer county treasurer, was
allowed until the first day of the
next regular term of the county
court, to file an additional bond.

The matter of the assessment of
Mrs. M. S. Smyth, for 1892, was
dismissed. The court holding it
had no jurisdiction in the matter.

The silver question is one, the
financiers, who have financed
this government into bankruptcy
and beggary in the midst of abun-
dant food to eat, drink, and wear, say is
hard to solve. What is best for the
people is a "sticker" and for the
life of them they can not see how
it's possible to help the people and
at the same time satisfy their busi-
ness friends, the banker, the bond
holder, the gold bug, and Wall
Street. Ah! gentlemen there is the
sticking point. We dearly love
the people because it's their votes
that gives us an easy berth, but
then we are married to Wall Street,
and haven't the heart or "sand" to
sue for a divorce, but still we love
the people and will gladly encircle
them with our arms and rest their
heads upon our bursting hearts
while they starve to death." The
dearly beloved people, even in the
"ignorant south" have intelligence
enough to know that industries of
every nature must come to a stand-
still, in the absence of money to
carry them on. Before silver was
demonetized, and when the popula-
tion of the United States was only
half, or less, than it is at this time,
commercial activity in its infancy,
and industries but few, there was
40 per cent more money in cir-
culation than there is now.

That's funny, isn't it Mr. Con-
gress? If it takes fifty dollars per
capita to support the people and
not one tenth of that amount in
circulation, will not a whole lot of

us have to go short? Then how can
we expect our industries and agri-
culture to thrive? Where is the la-
borer to get work, when there is no
money to pay him? Then how is he
to support himself and family?
How can the farmer get rid of his
produce and no money in circula-
tion to buy it? What is the good of
our mines if the government, to
please Wall Street, refuses to coin
the bullion? How can congress ex-
pect the government to prosper
confined to a narrow gold basis and
that controlled by a half dozen in-
dividuals? It is the money inactu-
al circulation that makes prosper-
ous, good times. A country is not
rich when its wealth is in the hands
and under the control of a few
millionaires, to put in circulation
when it pleases them to do so, or
withdraw it from circulation when
they desire a panic. And congress
don't know how to remedy the
evil? When it comes to financial
and tariff legislation, the lie, fraud,
deception, and base corruption, has
been plainly written upon the
pages of our congressional record
for years, and people are classing it
with the fair banks and gambling
dens of the world. We sincerely
hope the present congress will do
something to redeem itself as an
honorable body of men having the
confidence of the nation in its abili-
ty to maintain the honor of our re-
public.
