He has, also, two educated ponies which are well versed in tricks or performances, such as seen in circuses. The act which he performs of surrounding his wife with bowie knives was well executed, but we do not approve of that kind of sport so will not enter into a rapturous description of that part of his show. His performances are worth the money paid.

—The chinaman found dead last Wednesday, near here on the river, was decided to be a case of suicide as it is known that he bought at W. E. Grace's drug store, the day he disappeared, a vial of morphine. No marks of violence were found on his person, neither any indications of a struggle, these facts were considered conclusive evidence that morphine caused his death, taken with that intent, or it might have been he took an overdose, accidentally.

—Frank Hibler, son of Mrs. M. Hibler, of this place, and brother of Mrs. Lytle Howard and Mrs. J. C. Adkins, arrived here a few days ago. Mr. Hibler had not seen any of his relatives for twenty years. He left home when nineteen years of age, and has visited Europe and Australia and rambled over the greater portion of the United States, Canada and Mexico. He only learned of the whereabouts of his mother and sisters when he came into Burns during the races and was talking with a man regarding the merits of Red S., owned by Lytle Howard. His folks have for a long time believed him dead and could hardly believe their eyes when they saw him.—Harney Times.

—We received a copy of the Alaska Journal, a paper published in Juneau Alaska. In it is published the trial and acquittal, of John Dalton alias Jack Miller, well known here. It will be remembered by our readers that early last spring the HERALD published an account of a difficulty which occurred at Juneau, between Jack and Daniel McGinnis, in which McGinnis was shot, and died from the wound in a few hours. The trial came off in the District Court of that place in June. There is a detailed account of the trial given in the Journal, for which we haven't space, but it was clearly proven that the accidental discharge of Jack's pistol caused the death of McGinnis. Jack was therefore declared by the jury "not guilty." There is also a letter published in the Journal written by Lieutenant E. J. Glave the noted African and Alaskan explorer, who spent two years in the interior of Alaska accompanied by Jack. Lieutenant Glave asserts positively as his opinion, knowing Jack as well as he did, that he believed him to be innocent of wilful murder. The report here that he was ordered after his acquittal, to leave the country immediately is not correct. It seems from the perusal of his trial that he was not only innocent of wilful murder, but that he was engaged in an undertaking at that time, that was of very great benefit to the territory, by establishing a post among the interior Indians, his efforts in doing this was greatly impeded by the chileat Indians aided by this McGinnis and his friends.

DIED.—At Drewsey Oregon Sept. 28 1893, Mrs. W. F. Moffett aged 66 years 9 months and 12 days.

Mrs. Moffett was born in Boone county Mo. Dec. 16 1826. At the age of 20 years she removed with her parents to Adair county Mo and was there married May 2 1848 to W. F. Moffett. In July of the same year she went with her husband to Monroe county Iowa where they remained until the year 1853 when they crossed the plains and settled in Washington Ter. near Vancouver. In 1864 they came to The Dalles Oregon and from thence in 1866 to Grant county where they resided until 1891 when they moved to Harney county. Mrs. Moffett leaves a husband and three children respectively Jas. F. Moffett, Mrs. C. P. Rutherford and Robt. P. Moffett. She has two sisters living Maria Hunsacker who resides in Baker City and Amanda J. Hart of Oakland Oregon.

Mrs. Moffett suffered a great deal during her last illness and by her kind and sympathetic deeds during life leaves a host of friends to mourn her demise. "We only know that thou hast gone And that the same returning tide Which bore thee from us, still glides on And we who mourn thee with it glide."

Jerry Winters, who left here with 23 head of horses for the Eastern market two weeks ago, was in the railroad wreck on the 12th and ten of his horses were killed. The wreck was caused by a large rock rolling on the track and displacing the rails. George Cline has just returned from The Dalles and says Mr. Winters is at that place trying to effect a settlement with the railroad company. The horses which were not killed were badly injured and none will be fit to put on the market, hence he will bring them back to his ranch.—Ochoco Review.
