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Dionysius Latas, the archbishop of Zante, Greece, who is in this country on his way to Chicago to attend the religious congress, is a man of imposing and patriarchal aspect. He is fifty-seven years old and is a native of Zante. He has held his present office in the Greek church since 1854. Previous to his promotion as archbishop he was, as archimandrite, the best known preacher in Greece. At an early age he attended the Greek seminary in Jerusalem, where he remained for ten years, afterward spending four years at the University of Athens.

Later he studied for a year in the university of Strasburg, before the annexation to Germany, and three years at the universities of Berlin,

Leipzig and other German universities, and then spent some time in England. From 1870 to 1884 he was the eloquent preacher of Athens, when he became archbishop. After the religious congress is over the archbishop intends making a tour of the country. Speaking of the proposed movement to join the Greek and English churches, the archbishop said: "It may come, but there are many difficulties in the way. I like the movement, and desire the union most heartily, but perhaps it is not time yet. As to a union with the Catholic church, there are many almost insurmountable difficulties; the time for such a union is very far off. It will, doubtless, be some time before the Greek church makes a change of any kind."

A VENERABLE SCHOLAR.

Dr. Mommsen, the Famous German Jurist and Historian.

On November 8 Prof. Theodor Mommsen, the eminent German jurist and historian, will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of his doctorate. A number of representative students in the chief European countries have formed a committee to arrange for a commemoration of this occasion, and they now invite subscriptions to a fund for the endowment of research and scholarship in Mommsen's special field. The ultimate form of the endowment will be settled by the historian himself. The treasurer of the general committee is Herr Ludwig Delbruck, 61 and 63 Mauerstrasse, Berlin. Dr. Mommsen was born at Garding in Schleswig, November 30, 1817. He became professor of law at Leipzig

while still a young man. Having been dismissed for the part he took in political affairs he was made titular professor of law at Zurich in 1852, at Breslau in 1854 and at Berlin in 1858. In 1875 he was appointed professor of jurisprudence in the university of Leipzig. On June 15, 1882, he was tried at Berlin for having in an election speech slandered Prince Bismarck, but was acquitted. The decision was appealed against, and the imperial high court of appeal at Leipzig finally acquitted Prof. Mommsen of the charge. In 1880 Prof. Mommsen's library was destroyed by fire and a number of his English admirers had the happy idea of presenting him with a selection of classical and historical books printed in England to compensate him for some portion of his loss.
