—The artisan well problem will soon be solved as Mr. Kellogg will be boring for water in a day or two and we presume he will average probably, 50 feet in depth a day. If it be a success we can rest assured of better times in our country in the near future as the want of proper means of irrigation has been a great drawback to the settlement and development of the country.

—It is thought by the stage drivers on the Ontario line that the man who has the third time appeared at about the same place on the road and on Monday night shot at the driver, must be insane. Whether insane or not some steps should be taken for his arrest, as the drivers and passengers on the route do not wish to be made the target of either a sane or insane individual.

The punishment for persons convicted of libel shall be a fine of not less than one hundred dollars nor more than five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than three months nor more than one year. In sentencing Mr. Luce to pay a fine of \$300 Judge Clifford said: "It is not my purpose to send you to jail—which penalty might fall to the lot of any man convicted as you have been, though he were worth hundreds of thousands of dollars." The Judge also said that "When it is taken into consideration that your attacks for the past year have been directed at this court and its officers, you can expect more leniency from me than I could from you, were our position reversed. I am also aware that any fine imposed under this verdict you are abundantly able to pay. Although the jury that tried you made no recommendations for mercy, I shall not impose the maximum." The cry was raised before the trial that "the court was prejudiced." Judge Clifford has dispelled that notion, and has shown a noble nature in failing to mete out the extreme penalty to a man whose enmity towards him appeared to be "second nature." Clifford's friends are more numerous now, while his enemies cannot longer accuse him of being influenced by malice. — Canyon News.
