CORVALLIS, Dec. 16, 1893.—The O. P. R. R. was sold yesterday, and bought by Attorney Clark a representative of the Blair Wharton faction of New York, for the sum of \$200,000. The following we get from the Gazette of yesterday: "Messrs. Hughes and Clark represent and are acting for the joint committee of the bondholders and the receiver certificate holders, of which committee Mr. James A. Blair is chairman. Only such bondholders and certificate holders as have contributed to the fund to purchase the road will share in the benefits of its purchase. Such bondholders and certificate holders as have not contributed to this fund are simply left out in the cold and lose their interest in the property. The majority part of the bondholders, headed by Mr. Blair, which has so long been struggling to rescue the property from its entanglements, has thus succeeded in its efforts, and as Mr. Blair and his friends represent an immense amount of money, and now have full control of the property, there is no doubt but what its further extension and development are fully assured. This cannot but be welcome news to every inhabitant of the Willamette valley and the echoes of the sale will be greedily caught up by eastern Oregon, which has been looking with longing eyes for the eastward extension of this road. The passing of the road into such strong hands must mean its extension very shortly over the Cascade mountains, and as the energetic management will doubtless be continued, it means the perpetuation on the enlarged scale of the active competition with the other roads of the state, which has tended so effectually to keep down exorbitant rates throughout the valley."

Harney Valley, proper, contains 15 or 16 hundred square miles. The area of the valley itself, without including any other valleys or parts of the county, is greater than that of the state of Rhode Island and nearly equal to the state of Connecticut.

The whole of the valley is as level almost, as a floor, along the streams we have the very best of hay land as well as farming, the soil of the whole valley is alluvial and produces astonishing crops of oats, hay, wheat, barley rye, all kind of vegetables grown in high climates, grow here in abundance irish pot-toes cabbage, carrots, beets, turnips, rutabagas, squashes, ect.

The sage brush lands, after getting rid of the sage brush, which is not a hard matter, cannot be beaten in the known world for easy cultivation, the soil is fine and not a rock, root or stump to interfere with the plow. The greatest draw back is want of moisture, very little irrigation is necessary to insure good returns but that little is necessary, and the artesian well process going on at this time we are satisfied will evidently remove that obstacle to cultivation. Mr Kellogg struck flowing water at a distance of 330 feet, the flow is 30 gallons per minute or 180 gallons an hour, but he is satisfied he can get a greater pressure consequently is going deeper.

Although the attitude is high the hardy fruits can be grown here, that has been tested and we have several apple and plum orchards in the County.

Harney Valley is not all of Harney County by any means, we have Silver Creek Valley an excellent farming country and well watered, we have the Pea Valley, Diamond, Silvies, Catlow, Warm Spring and others, besides the Pine Creek, Calamity and Drewsey country all containing splendid agricultural lands.

There is no country in the U. S. has a brighter prospect for a successful future than Harney County. But some one says "it's so liable to frost," so it is but what country is clear of draw-backs and pests of some nature, and moreover it is the history of this coast that cultivation and irrigation does away in a

great measure, with the effects of frost.

What we need is energy and some capital to develop our county.

We do not advise any one without some money to try his luck here, for such would experience a very hard time before getting above want and in living circumstances. But how many countries or districts can be named where men without money have clear sailing, and easy access to this world's goods and comforts.
