Silver Bill of Representative Oates of Alabama.

Silve-Bill of Representative Oates of Alabama, Introduced on the 3rd Providing for the Coinage of Silver Bullion now owned by the U.S.

Section 1. All silver bullian now owned by the United States shall be coined as speedily as practicable into standard silver dollars of the weight and fineness as now prescribed by law, which shall be legal tender in payment of all debts, publie and private, provided oneseventh | and the malt beverage did not come part of said bullion may be coined into half dollars, quarter-dollars. and dimes in the proportion d.rected by the secretary of the treasury utes. and to contain such amounts pure silver and alloy as now prescribed by law for such coinage.

Sec. 2. The secretary of the treasury shall set apart \$40,000,000 oined as aforesaid for the redemp tion of notes issued by the treasury and paid out for the purchase of silver bullion in the manner provided for in the act of July 14, 1890 and whenever said sum is reduced below \$40,000,000 by redemption of said notes the secretary shall, from any other silver dollars in the treasury not otherwise appropriated add to said sum so as to keep it up to \$40,000,000 until the agregate amount of said notes outstanding is reduced below that sum, and then the secretary shall keep in the treasury for redemption an amount of silver dollars equal to the amount of notes outstanding until all are redeemed; provided, the secretary may reissue any of said notes when redeemed as provided in the act of July 14, 1890.

Sec. 3 Any contract hereafter made by the United States government, or between corporations, or between corporations and a person or persons, or between private persons, which is by its terms or by law payable in dollars or dollars and cents, may be paid at its maturity or thereafter in any lawful coin of the United States.
