—The 2nd of this month was a proud day. And if that gentleman ventured out he certainly saw his shadow, which, according to an old saying, means 40 days of cold disagreeable winter weather.

—Sam Miller on the evening of the 1st. was treated to a genuine tinhorn serenade. Sam says this is the second time in his life he has been so honored, the first was 25 years ago. He thinks it is a long time between times and requests more frequent visits of a like nature.

—Children have no business on the streets after dark, unless sent on special errands by their parents. There is no restraint put upon the children of Burns in any way shape or form, which gives them free license to form licentious, disgusting, degrading habits, and characters for the penitentiary and gallows.

—We hope our town council will take the matter in hand and in some way provide the town a Marshal, who will strictly attend to business and make arrests for fighting quarreling, using profane or obscene language, and arrest any and all, who make themselves liable, regardless of state or condition. A few arrests and fines would certainly have a healthy effect upon the morals of Burns.

—Attorney M. R. Biggs is prominently spoken of as the coming candidate on the democratic ticket for the office of District Prosecuting Attorney. The citizens of our county will do well to advance the interest of Mr. Biggs for this office, because of the honor of so important an office being conferred upon one of its citizens, besides he is temperate, sober and eminently qualified for the position.

—Ex-Receiver Hadley, of the O. P. railroad has filed his final report with the court in Corvallis. The report covers 50 pages and is made up of itemized accounts. When he assumed charge, the road was carrying an indebtedness in the shape of receivers' certificates of \$800,000. Due to employes \$127,000. For material \$25,000. After his appointment confidence was restored and he was able immediately to dispose of \$40,000 of his certificates at par, this was paid to employes. By disposing of various offices cutting salaries etc., he was able to operate the road at total annual saving of \$100,000. He asks the court to allow him \$10,000 for his services as receiver.

—The democratic state convention will be held in Astoria April 17th. This county is allowed three delegates.

—This town is certainly in need of a Marshal, if any town on the civilized globe is. The sheriff and his deputy cannot always be present to prevent rows and make arrests and it is not expected of them. We are well aware of the fact that our corporation is now so heavily involved that it is not expedient for our town municipal officers to incur the additional expense of employing a Marshal, but could it not be done in the following manner: The town council appoint a Marshal without a stipulated salary, but to get his fees for arrests etc., also be allowed to act as constable, getting the fees allowed for services in that office before the justice of the peace and recorder and if necessary have him commissioned by the county court.

—Is Burns absolutely without law? And is it possible, if we have any law restraining fighting, obscenity, the lowest villainous vulgarity and slang expressions possible for the human tongue to emit, that the town authorities are powerless to enforce the law? How long is this state of affairs going to exist, or rather, be countenanced by the citizens? Our children are getting lessons in profanity, fighting and lawlessness every day and this is all the lessons they are reciting. Must we longer shut our eyes to the fact that we are, by example, inculcating principles in the children of our town, the most vicious demoralizing and licentious that a civilized people can imagine. Is this their inheritance? and could we formulate a more diabolical scheme to lead children to hell or mark a broader road to sure destruction than the one daily followed in our town? Vulgarity, slang phrases and profanity is the common dialect of the town, in the stores, on the street and in the saloons, interspersed with fights and quarrels to give the example set, more force. Parents for what purpose are we raising our children? We hear daily children, only seven and eight years old, use the most vulgar, the most profane, the most disgusting language conceivable. You need not ask where and how they learn it? Because we know of ourselves it is the dialect of our town, and many persons who have been reared to respect law and morality instead of restraining such, vie with each other in promulgating the language that brings the blush of shame to the cheek and lowers the individual in his own estimation. Is it not time we should stop and consider consequences? The men of our town are not naturally any more vicious and immoral than men of other towns, but without restraint the bad that is in us naturally comes to the front. The law prohibiting obscene and profane language, fighting, etc., is a dead letter here and until this law is rigidly enforced we cannot expect any reformation.
