Several men from that section who arrived here to day as witnesses in the United Sates Court, give the following account of the affair:

Last Friday Frank Phillips, who was one of the most notoricus leaders of the McCoy faction during the last feud, in which many lives on both sides were lost, came down from his headquarters in the moun tains of Kentucky and crossed the boundary at St. Peter's Creek, where he learned that Bob Hatfield, son of Anse Hatfield, was somewhere near.
