ED HERALD: We deem our local papers, which are supported by us, as the medium through which we have a right to express our opinions politically or otherwise, and it to be the duty of such papers to publish our thoughts and wishes so long as such communications contain nothing libelous or falsehoods.

I wish to express a few thoughts for the consideration of the thinking people of Eastern Oregon.

In a short time we will be called upon to select men to fill our state and county offices. All good citizens should have a desire to see our state and county in a prosperous, thriving condition and all honest thinking men of whatever calling are well aware that business cannot thrive and the government prosper except the machinery be run by honest competent officers. Men shown by their past records, that they are worthy, and cannot be bought by corporations and political demagogues.

The condition of our government to day is sufficient evidence of the corruption caused by corporations and moneyed aristocrats.

We have around us sufficient food and all other necessities of life to make existence enjoyable, happy and content, and still millions of our people go hungry and many actually starving. How to bring supply and demand together seems to be a perplexing problem.

the extra session of congress was convened for that purpose and accomplished naught, the present session has done nothing. The members caring but little for the wishes of their constituents.

Voters, of Harney County, think of the suffering masses of humanity and the homeless, hungry and destitute, caused by monopoly rule. Many of you have been deprived of your homes by this same money power, and still such come clamoring for office and your votes to give them authority to fleece you and deprive you of the home promised by the government.

Think of these "booster" hirelings, striving to enrich the monopoly, depopulate the county, stop immigration and have made many honest settlers homeless and destitute.

Our conventions both republican and democratic are packed and manipulated by a ring monopoly, now let us put our shoulder to the wheel and down these oily tongued hypocrites, through the ballot box.

We remember, to our sorrow, the vows and promises of fidelity made, only to be broken by one of this class, who has a handle to his name, the title I am not going to discuss, or dispute but ask, What he did with the money received from the poor honest settlers of this valley on promise of giving them value received? Did you do it? How about the money that was donated by the then prosperous settlers to defray your expenses to Salem on promise that you would use every effort to aid us in getting our homes? Did you keep your promise? And further how about the one thousand dollars offered you by the monopoly not to go before the commissioners in Salem in behalf of the settlers of this valley? Did you take the money? You got admitted to the bar, came home and notified the settlers that you were now entitled to practice before any court, renewed your promises and asked us to stay with you. Our staying qualities were pretty good, for we stayed with you until you got the last loaf and then you dropped us like "Paddy did the skunk."

Then came the soothing voices of the monopoly, saying "be quiet, be still, we have use for you," and finally one A. W. came to your aid and through him the agency of the road land was obtained, but still the supply was short and the demand increased, then come little Johnny whose boasting qualities are well known in Burns, said he, "I can give you a hoist in political fame that may bring the supply equal to the demand, but you will have to join the booster band" his services were accepted and Johnny embraced the monopoly. And through this united influence with money to back it the captain obtained the nomination for an office, not because he was the man the people wanted, but as a tool to be used for certain purposes, and to defeat an honest man, whom, if nominated, would certainly be elected, regardless of the one held in reserve that was their choice. And now captain you have your own canoe to paddle while Johnny steers the rudder. Your bark is in deep water but can you keep clear of breakers? The good people of Harney Valley have gotten their eyes open and are doing their own thinking and on election day will do their own voting, regardless of moneyed aristocrats who boast of ruling the people or will ruin them financially.

We have a system of voting now by which no man can molest or interfere, and when placed before us we make our own choice, and furthermore it is no longer a question of party in Harney County but a question of men, then let us give the matter more than a passing thought before casting our "ballots, even if it should be only a county judge or justice of the peace. In writing this communication it is not the intention to cast any reflections upon any political party, because it is not always the choice of the party that gets the nomination, but the choice of the rings and moneyed aristocrat is frequently are shoved to the front.
