Notice Of Election Laws.

A voter must be a resident of the state 6 months, the county 3 months and precinct 30 days. A single man's home is where he sleeps and keeps his clothes. Any person absent from the county for a time not intending to return and returning is disqualified until compliance with the election law. Or if absent and voted in another county or state is disqualified. Every voter must vote in his home precinct. The election laws are plain and distinct and proper attention by the Judges is all that is necessary to a fair election and prevention of illegal voting.

ED HERALD: The kick made against road work, published in your paper last week is a contradiction of itself. The writer kicks because the roads are worked and kicks because the roads get so little work. The high water this spring not only in this county but all around us washed out the roads and bridges which made the roads in many places impassable and what could a county court do other than have them repaired. The sloughs near your town got in such a condition as to make it almost impossible to get to town, and necessity compelled the board to work the roads, re-place bridges etc. It was not of choice but compulsion.
