**MEANS WAR.**

The people of Bridgeport, Penn., are perturbed over what is believed to be a certain indication of war which manifested itself a few days ago. A spring on the farm of Samuel Coats, in Upper Merion Township, near the borough line, has been sending forth a copious flow of water after being dry for nearly 30 years. James Henderson is the tenant of the Coats farm, and on the spot where the spring is bubbling he had some wheat, as he did in the rest of the field. The land slopes from the top of the high hill, on which is the reservoir of the Bridgeport Water Company. Supposing when he first beheld the gush of water, that the reservoir was leaking, Farmer Henderson ran to Bridgeport and notified his landlord, who is Superintendent of the water company. The latter, when he learned that "a big spring of water was flowing in the wheat field," did not feel the least concerned about the water company's property, but he did become alarmed for the safety of the nation. Landlord Coats, who is now a Justice of the Peace, carried a gun during the rebellion. The year before the war began the spring flowed then as it is flowing now. When the civil war was over it became as dry as a powder horn. Squire Coat's father, when he saw the water burst forth in the wheat field one day late in the fall of 1859, remarked to the neighbors that there would be war, and war there was. The elder Coats, whose Christian name was Lindsay, saw the spring flow once before, and then his father told him that there would be war. That

was in the year 1811. At that time, too, the spring flowed freely until after the battle of New Orleans, when it again became dry.

The reason why Lindsay Coats predicts war with such unerring certainty is that there is a legend in the family that the periodic gushes of spring are precedent to and continuous with a hostile clash of the armed nation. The Squire's father is now deceased, but the Squire remembers hearing him tell of the spring's action in 1811. Coupled with that is the direct evidence of his own eyes in 1860. In 1869 during the great rain the spring remained dry. Squire Coats is telling his neighbors to prepare for any emergency which may arise

**Returned To McKinley.**

CINCINNATI, O., June 9.—A special to the Commercial Gazette from Massillon, O., says that to day the Miners' Relief Committee of Massillon returned to Governor McKinley the \$10 he contributed to their subscription for the relief of unemployed miners on the 29th of May, which he spoke of in his letter of transmission as his "mite." Here is the letter of the Relief Committee: Massillon, O., June 9, 1894.—William McKinley, Governor of Ohio: Sir:—I enclose you will find \$10, your donation to the miners of Massillon. They emphatically refuse to accept a "mite" from the hand that assisted in suiting them. Your donation was solicited because the miners believed you was at least in as much sympathy with them as the ordinary everyday citizen, but since you have divested yourself of your covering and your true character stands out in glowing colors, they abhor the contamination of your charity. Your ambition in a political way so far as the miners are concerned is sure to be gratified henceforth. Yours, etc.

One man killed near Terre-Haute Ind., by miners. The Governor of Indiana has in all probability, martial law. At Cripple Creek Col., two men were killed on the 6th, and thirty deputies driven off. The strikers of Cripple Creek have laid down their arms. Troops have been ordered to the scene of the strike in Eastern Ohio. In West Virginia the strikers are burning bridges and blowing up trestles etc. etc., the same all along the line. So much for foreign immigration.
