Grand Jury Report.

Circuit Court of the State of Ore. for Harney County.

In the matter of the final report of the Grand Jury.

We the Grand Jury of the County of Harney and State of Ore., respectfully report at this time to the above entitled court as follows:

1st We have been in session two days at the regular term, and eight days at the adjourned term of court and have found nine true bills, and three not true bills of indictment.

2nd Many have come before us which, for lack of time, we have not been able to investigate. Among other things the matter of artesian well, and the matter of the foundation of the court house in this county. That many of the tax payers of the county are demanding an explanation and report of the things, which the grand jury have not the time to do. Wherefore we respectfully recommend that the court of this county be instructed to examine at the regular term thereof into the contract and work performed thereunder, in reference to these things the appropriations and accounts and to report through public print to the tax-payers of the county the true condition thereof.

3rd We have visited the offices and examined the books of the County Clerk, Sheriff and County Treasurer and found them kept in a neat and orderly manner, but from a lack of time, and inability to ascertain the exact condition of things, for want of expert assistance, would recommend that the books and accounts of the three several offices mentioned be examined by experts appointed by the Judge of this court, to assist the next grand jury in their investigation of the same.

4th That it has come to the

knowledge of the grand Jury that there is personal property, to-wit, from one hundred to a hundred and forty head of horses and from fifty to one hundred head of cattle in this county, the property of one William Altnow, that has not been given in, in any sworn statement of the said owner to the assessors of this county, for the year 1894, but the information and the statements of the witnesses were too indefinite as to the amount of said property, to do aught at this time than call the attention of the court to the matter and recommend that the board of equalization investigate said matter and cause said property to be duly assessed and the taxes thereon collected.

Lastly, we also return our thanks to Hon. M. D. Clifford, Circuit Judge, for the prompt, courteous and able manner, in which he has discharged his duties, and presided during the adjourned term of the above entitled court. Also Jas. A. Fee, Circuit Judge, who presided at the regular term, also to Thorton Williams, the acting district attorney, by the order of the court, for his attention to his duties, and the aid and assistance he has rendered us in the course of our labors, also to Charles Hill, our bailiff, who has afforded us every attention, and having now completed the aforesaid matters, to the extent above indicated, we ask to be discharged.
