—There has been several saddles stolen in this county lately, and as a natural consequence, the owners are anxious to recover their property, and bring the perpetrators to justice, also the civil officers would like to catch the thieves, and make an example of some one of them for further security to our property. Several warrants have been issued but up to this date the result has been a failure, not being able to capture the thief. The three warrants that have been issued the Justice has not, nor does not intend putting in any bill to the county court for his services, although he is just as anxious as a y one for the capture of the thieves, but the efforts, as yet, for the capture proving a failure does not signify that the officers are making a pretense for the money that is in it. For instance take the last case, and from the way the matter was represented the officers thought they had almost a sure thing of it. Two men were armed with the necessary papers to arrest the thief and set in the direction of Patsley, they were gone several days but were on the wrong track, consequently nothing came of it, the officers could not possibly make anything out of that trip, if any one made wages it was the two men deputized, and they should be paid for their time. We sincerely hope that some of these thieves may be yet caught but where the civil authorities are only interested hoping the thieves may be brought to justice and be punished for the offense, it rather throws a damper upon the effort to catch them to be accused of going on wild goose chases for the money that is in it. Neither can we see where the blunder comes in, a man has a saddle stolen, and he knows it, he demands a warrant and an effort made to catch the thief. That is the sum and substance of the matter.
