We presume from some cause, the school building which our citizens fully expected to be built this fall, has been delayed indefinitely, or at least until next spring, we do not see or hear of any preparations being made for its erection. Still the money has been ready for some time, either here or in a Portland bank, and since the bonds have been accepted and taken we of course are paying interest, and receiving no benefit.

The county judge's convention which met at Portland in considering the reports of committees. The committee on salaries of officers recommend that the law be so amended that the salaries of sheriffs, county clerks, clerks of the circuit court and recorders of conveyances be in full payment of all services performed by them, as such officers, except that sheriffs shall be entitled to pay for boarding prisoners, and mileage each way at the rate of five cents for every mile over 20 he travels in discharge of his duty. The salaries of deputies to be fixed by the county courts. Each county to have a county attorney to be paid a salary, whose duty it is to assist the county officials, and prosecute criminals, and the abolishing of the district attorney's office. Assessors to be paid a salary, mileage and expenses. In making these recommendations, or petitions or rather both, to the legislature why not also recommend that each county have its own representative?
