In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Harney To the Hon. Jas. A. Fee, Judge of the above entitled court:

We, the undersigned, Grand Jury drawn for the October 1894 term, respectfully submit this our final report:

In the discharge of our duties we have carefully investigated all charges of crime to which our attention has been called, and disposed of them to the best of our ability.

We have examined the records of the county clerk and sheriff and find them in good condition and properly kept.

We have also examined the county treasurer and assessor, and they have given us the desired information, asked for, under oath, and which we herewith annex.

We have examined the jail and find it insecure in every particular, and, therefore, condemn it.

We also recommend the speedy collection of all delinquent taxes.

And now having completed our labors, we return thanks to the Honorable Judge of the Circuit Court for courteous treatment, and to Deputy District Attorney for his untiring labor for us during the sitting of this grand jury.

We thank our Sheriff for his kind and gentlemanly treatment in giving us the attention we required.

SHERIFF GITTINGS' REPORT TO GRAND JURY.

Q—How much have you received for fees since the law requiring payment of the same to the county took effect?

A—\$12.90.

Q—How much in taxes have you collected for the year 1893?

A—\$27,548.91.

Q—How much are you allowed for a jailor?

A—\$3 per day while there is a prisoner or prisoners are in the jail.

Q—What is the present cost per day for keeping prisoners in the county jail?

A—Am allowed \$5 per week for board for each prisoner, paid in county scrip, which does not pay expenses.

Q—Do you consider the present jail a safe and sufficient building for the holding and keeping of prisoners?

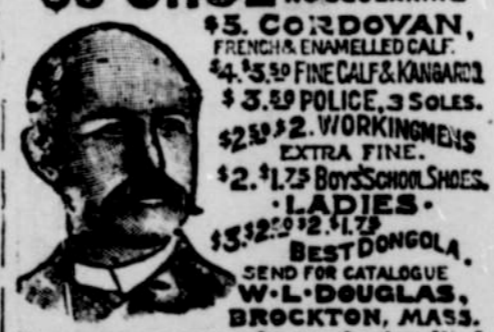
