ED HERALD: It is not my desire to hurt the influence or place an obstacle in the path of our minister, but we desire to vindicate the teachers of our Sunday School who are not members of the church. All persons who believe in a supreme being and Christ as our redeemer are termed christians whether they be members of a church or not. The minister, in his sermon last Sunday said, that "an individual ought to be ashamed to think of taking charge of a Sunday School class, when not a member of the church; What do you presume were the feelings of these persons, when he took privileges wholly unwarrantable, unjust, and we think in direct conflict to a true christian spirit? Is it justifiable in a preacher to insult persons for doing what they believed to be their duty? Now I was present at the last re-organization of our Sunday School, and there was only one church member present, and when a class selects an individual of good character, although outside the pale of the church, and the person accepts the position, it is certainly an insult to be told, by any one, preacher not excepted, that you are making a brazen idiot of yourself and blaspheming christianity. I know a man who is now in the U. S. Senate, who was not at the time I was intimately acquainted with his life, a member of any church still he was a Sunday School Superintendent for a number of years in a town where there plenty of church members. I myself have been interested in Sunday Schools ever since I've been large enough as a pupil and also frequently a teacher, and I have always found it a custom to allow a class to choose a teacher without any restrictions whatever. It being always taken for granted that the class will select a teacher of good moral character. Then we ask who is the more competent to take charge of a Sunday School class, one who has taken an interest in Sunday School work for years but not a member of the church, or one who has served the devil the better part of his life scoffing at everything religious, but who thinks his time on earth is short and to be on what he considers the safe side, turns over a leaf that's out the past and becomes a member of some church and a Sunday School teacher? If this test is necessary in a teacher it is also necessary in a choir and organist.
