

S. J. MCKENZIE, postmaster of Adrain, Minn., refuses to turn over the office and papers to one John T. King, who has been appointed by President Cleveland to succeed him. Orders came direct from the P. M. General to Mr. McKenzie to "let go" but he does not recognize the authority.

Cas. Downing, clerk of Spokane county Wash. is a defaulter in the sum of \$5000. When confronted with the information of his shortage he coolly replied that he had been taking small sums of county money at intervals ever since holding the office, and his reason for so doing was, his salary was not sufficient to support him.

John Burns, the English delegate to the American Federation of labor, while here uttered the following favorable criticism: "Since my arrival in America, in the short time I spent in Chicago and New York, I saw more poverty, dirt, wretchedness and misery than I have seen in all my life in England. Mark my words, in the next 25 years Americans will be emigrating to England, because that country in that time will have the model government of the world. It will be the only happy and contented people on earth."

THE democratic Senators have made earnest efforts since assembling to agree upon a program for the session. Two conferences have been held for the exchange of views, but the same old obstacles to harmony, namely different views and too many would-be leaders, still stand in the way.

We hope, however, some sort of an agreement may be reached, but this hope is something like the hope indulged in by a very sick man, that he may get well to please those democrats who have no sympathy with the attitude assumed by certain Senators elected as democrats, at the last session, and which is still maintained by them. At that time they adopted a rule of ruin policy, and notwithstanding the ruin which their rule has already accomplished they still stick to it.

MR. CLEVELAND proposes to stand by the financial plan proposed by Secretary Carlisle, which he believes to be a very statesmanlike financial document. The democrats in congress are doing some hard thinking on the financial plans now proposed. Speaker Crisp in his recent campaign in Georgia appeared as an advocate of free coinage. Mr. Bland proposes to give him an opportunity to show his hand and prove whether or not he is truly a silver man or still under the thumb of President Cleveland. He (Bland) will offer a free coinage bill as a substitute for the Carlisle currency bill. The point will be raised that it is not germane, and Crisp will be given a chance to demonstrate that he is in favor of free coinage. If the speaker does as he has done heretofore, he will rule against it, then Bland will appeal and the vote will test the

sense of the House on the question. It seems that many of them are reluctant to commit themselves on the finance situation, and the short time at the disposal of our legislators, increases the chances against the adoption of any comprehensive financial measure.
