Digest of Land Decisions.

A preference right of entry cannot be acquired through a fraudulent and collusive contest.

The purchaser of a relinquishment does not secure a preferred right to enter the land covered thereby.

A relinquishment filled after the initiation of a contest does not inure to the benefit of the contestant where it is found that it was not filed as the result of the contest.

A stone quarry of common building stone may not be entered as a placer claim.

SILVER LAKE, Ore Dec 25, '94. ED. HERALD: I have very bad news to write you this week, one of the worst calamities that could possibly befall a small community like ours. You have probably already heard of it, and given it to your readers, I mean the burning of the Crisman hall on Xmas eve and the awful loss of life, our entire neighborhood is in mourning, and indeed, it is truly appalling.

Nearly the whole of the citizens of this community were assembled in the Crisman hall enjoying the Xmas festivities, when a large lamp exploded setting fire to the building, 40 lives were lost and many injured of whom several will die. There was about one fourth of the number present burned to death.
