THE OREGON PACIFIC.

The Oregon Pacific.

CORVALLIS, Jan. 3.—The circuit court of Benton county convened at 2 p. m. to-day before Judge J. C. Fullerton. The first thing to come up was the Oregon Pacific sale. After some long and strong arguments on both sides, which consumed most of the afternoon, the matter was laid before Judge Fullerton who took it under advisement. The court ordered the case continued until January 19th to give Mr. Nash opportunity to communicate with his English friends and get \$50,000 here which he agrees to forfeit if they do not make a bid of at least \$200,000 on the day of the next sale. If he gets the money here and puts it up, in all probability a new sale will be ordered at an early date and the present one set aside. But from the tone of the judge's conversation, and of the people generally, it is the supposition that Mr. Nash's \$50,000 will not be forthcoming on the 19th, and if not it is a fact that Judge Fullerton will confirm the sale as made to Bonner & Hammond.—Roseburg Review.

Last Friday afternoon the town of Long Creek was visited by fire, and the Masonic Hall, Keney Bros. saloon and Wm. Runio's store were consumed. The fire originated in the hall from a defective flue. The saloon was next adjoining, and all the fixtures were saved. Mr. Rudio saved most of his large stock of general merchandise from the burning building. We understand he carried insurance to the amount of \$6,000, but whether on the building or goods we have been unable to learn. The Masonic hall was built by an incorporated company, and cost about 6,000. It was insured for 3,000. Long Creek people are bearing their misfortune bravely.

ANOTHER FLOOD THREATENED.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., Jan. 6.—This city is threatened with another flood. The melting snow, reinforced by the heavy rainfall of the past few days, is swelling the Coneaugh and Stony creek.

There is serious danger of a gorge at the Stone railroad bridge. With a terribly vivid recollection of the past, and a trembling horror of the future, the citizens are in the utmost trouble. Many are packing up their valuables and are getting out of this town of misfortune.

In spite of every precaution, if the ice in the river should jam and then break suddenly, it is very probable that another cataclysm would occur.—The Sun.
