We acknowledge the receipt from Wm. Beeson secretary of the assessors convention, of the report of the convention, and following we give as much of the proceedings as we think will be of interest to our readers:

The following change in the present assessment laws were suggested and a committee of five appointed, consisting of Sterling, Greenleaf, Wakefield, Parker and Yocum to act in conjunction with a committee appointed from the State Board of Equalization, to urge upon the coming legislature the importance of an improvement over our present laws to-wit:-

- 1st. As it requires one or two years for the assessor to become proficient, the term should be extended to four years.
- 2nd., That the number of rolls be reduced so as not to exceed two, besides a summary of the roll be furnished the Secretary of State.
- 3rd., That the law for the collection of poll tax be so amended as to allow the read supervisor to collect and apply it on the roads, or to exclude a man from the right of franchise, that is subject to a poll tax unless he produces his receipt at the polls.
- 4th., That all work pertaining to assessments be done under the supervision of the assessor.

The following resolutions were adapted:

Resolved; That it be the sense of this meeting that the assessor's office should be put on a salary and that the assessor's salary should be put on an equality with the other county officials in accordance with the amount of work done and that census work be paid one-third additional to the regular salary; as upon an examination of the census roll it was considered that double the amount of field work will be required, it is further

Resolved, That each assessor in the state be furnished with a copy of this resolution and the proceedings of this convention; and that each assessor should send to the chairman of the legislative committee an estimate of the amount of salary he should receive for assessing and for census work; and we recommend that each assessor confer with his county court as to the advisability of a salary system. It is also recommended by this convention that the making of the tax roll and all duplicates should be made by the assessors.

SILVER LAKE, Jan. 7th, '95.
ED. HERALD; I will write you further regarding the terrible disaster which occurred in our midst on Christmas eve at the Christmas tree gathering. There were 16 women 16 children and 8 men burned to death. Twenty-one who escaped death were, some of them, badly burned, 8 out of the number seriously. Though at this time all are doing well and hopes entertained of the final recovery of them. Several were injured and badly bruised by falling or rolling down stairs, in the hurry, confusion and excitement some lost their footing tumbling down the stairs resulting in bruises and hurts. Mrs. Comegys of Diamond Valley your county, was one among the number that was very much bruised. It requires much attention and many nurses to care for the unfortunates who are suffering with burns and bruises. Several ladies are here from Paisley and Summer Lake in the capacity of nurses. About \$400 was donated to help pay funeral expenses, buy medicine and employ physicians. The winter has been disagreeable and very windy, though not extremely cold. Snow has fallen several times but soon went off. The roads are very fine. We have no outside news the talk is entirely of the dead and injured, the citizens from far and near are helping to care for the suffering and condoling with those who lost friends. But it is better that we should turn our attention to the busy world and try to forget our losses, a life of weeping will do the dead no good.
