We acknowledge the receipt from Wm. Beeson secretary of the assesors convention, of the report of the convention, and following we give as much of the proceedings as we think will be of interest to our readers:

The following change in the pres ent assesment laws were suggested act in conjunction with a committee appointed from the State Board of Equalization, to urge upon the coming legislature the importance of an improvement over our present laws to-wit:--

1st., As it requiers one or two years for the assessor to become proficient, the term should be extended to four years.

2nd., That the number of rolls be reduced so as not to exceed two, besides a summery of the roll be furnished the Secretary of State.
