

The President's Message.

The President in his message to congress urging that body to take some steps to replenish the depleted treasury, makes no concession to silver, but practically advises the friends of silver to stand aside while he backed by Wall Street and the money monopoly of the world issues more bonds. The last two issues of bonds have resulted quickly in a depleted treasury, and still the President advises another issue. He says "the treasury is being de spoiled of gold without cancelling a single obligation of the government, solely for the benefit of those who find a profit in shipping it abroad or hoarding it at home, and further he states, "I do not understand that the friends of silver desire the condition that might follow inaction or neglect to appreciate the meaning of the present exigency if it should result in entire banishment of gold from our financial and currency arrangements.

The president advises 3 per cent bonds issued in denominations \$20 and \$50 and their multiples and made payable in fifty years. There is nothing in the message whatever to encourage silver men, on the other hand, we believe, every obstacle possible will be thrown in the way of silver legislation, by the administration, and we hope the friends of silver will not suffer themselves to be deceived as they were in the instance of the repeal of the sherman law. We believe the silver man, remembering the repeal of the sherman law, will fight to a finish, any effort made for continued issue of bonds, which has and always will leave us in the "hole".

The people of this government know full well, that bond issues mean nothing but, a scourge to the laboring class, that bond issues is the father of millionaires and that with the demonization of silver is now causing the distress and starvation of our people. Let the administration and gold men argue what they will they cannot refute the acknowledged fact that the gold standard takes our circulating medium out of circulation and gives the fortunate few unlimited power over our currency and opens the way for that few to make millions at the expense of the laborer and producer.

What did the millionaire ever produce? Nothing but want and starvation. Take the two, we mean, the tramp and the millionaire and the tramp is the more honorable, because the millionaire made the tramp, and he knows it, and takes no steps to undo the great wrong he has perpetrated on the people.
