

A Subsidized Press.

At a banquet of the New York press, an editor (Whitelaw Reid) of one of the great dailies, responded to the toast, "The Independent Press," as follows:

"There is no such thing in America as an independent press, unless it is out in the country towns. You are all slaves. You know it and I know it. There is not one of you who dares to express an honest opinion. If you express it, you know beforehand that it would never appear in print. I am paid \$150 for keeping honest opinions out of the paper I am connected with. Others of you are paid similar salaries for doing similar things. If I should allow honest opinions to be printed in one issue of my paper, like Othello, before twenty-four hours my occupation would be gone. The man who would be so foolish as to write honest opinions would be out on the street hunting another job. The business of New York journalists is to distort the truth, to lie outright to pervert; to vilify, to fawn at the feet of mammon and to sell his country and his race for his daily bread, or for what is about the same thing, his salary. You know this and I know it; and what foolery to be toasting an 'independent press.' We are the tools and the vassals of rich men behind the scenes. We are jumping jacks. They pull the string and we dance. Our time, our talents, our lives, our possibilities, are all the property of other men. We are intellectual prostitutes."—Exchange.
