Van Or, Mar 26th. Spring has got here at last.

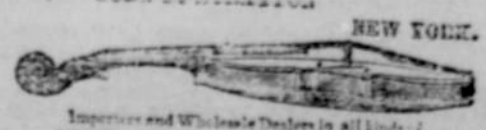
Chas Cochran & Brother Dan'l are visiting friends in this neighborhood the former has applied for the Woolf Creek school.
