

THE Salt Lake constitutional state convention, passed the women suffrage clause, on the 2nd of this month by a large majority. An amendment, favoring the submission of the clause, to the vote of the people, was defeated by a vote of 70 to 30.

THE women in Ohio are now allowed to vote in school elections, in Cincinnati on the 2nd of this month, they manifested unusual interest in the election, and their influence and votes were felt to a big degree. In one place they defeated both democratic and republican candidates, and many women were elected to office throughout the state.

UTAH will be admitted to statehood in November, making the 45th state of this union. A state convention is now in session framing a constitution, and woman suffrage will be one of its features.

It now looks, as if, it will be only a matter of time, and not a long time either, until woman suffrage will be a recognized constitutional right in this republic.

The old adage says, "what is to be will be" but we have our doubts about it being better for our government it seems as if the farther we drift from the paths of our revolutionary fathers the more frail it comes our power to sustain a self government. Rome stood 400 years, and then succumbed, feeling that self government was a myth. Or at least their prejudices, obstinacy, and love of power and money sunk into insignificance its former greatness, and great effort to prove man capable of self government.

And now if our government has become so weak, corrupted and vile as to cause our own wives, daughters, sisters, and mothers to lose confidence in our ability to sustain and perpetuate our own self respect and a pure democratic independent form of government. It makes us feel as if we were on our last "legs" and its now necessary for our women to step in take hold of the helm and steer the old ship into a harbor of safety. Should not our leading men, statesmen and voters feel proud of our record as men and voters? Our congressman and state legislators, certainly feel proud of themselves, when the women of our land feel the necessity of calling them down from the high place they now occupy, because of the loss of confidence in their integrity and ability to protect our political welfare and run a government for the good of the whole people, protecting our rights and the honor of our government.

God help! such a set of law makers, we had better put them in petticoats and the now petticoats, in their places, it may be some respect would be shown for the rights of the people.
