### Declared for free Silver.

Owensboro, Ky., May 16—The convention of Western Kentucky Democrats held here to day for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Railroad Commissioners closed with a most exciting clash over the money question. As soon as the nomination was made the convention was turned into a howling crowd of gold and silver cranks. Senator Blackburn, who is making his fight for re election on a free silver platform, led the contest and he was aided by ex Congressman Ellis. Resolutions calling for the unrestricted coinage of silver were passed and recommended to the Democracy of the State. After declaring for a tariff for revenue only this declaration was made on the currency question:  
"We declare it to be an elementary principle of Democracy's faith that both gold and silver coin shall constitute the primary money of the country; that both metals shall be received for mintage without discrimination against either, and at the legal ratio that existed prior to 1873 [16 to 1], and we demand the unrestricted coinage of both gold and silver at this legal ratio, and that both metals be declared full legal tender in payment of all debts, public and private."—The World.

Port Townsend, May 19—Hardly had the news been received of the death of William L. Powell, Indian agent of Neah bay, before aspirants for the office had petitions in circulation, asking for the appointment. Several leading democrats of this city expressed a desire to go into the contest, but doubted the propriety of the action until, as they averred, the county is blessed with a democratic administration. Chas. Adle, telegraph operator and signal service reporter at Neah bay, is the leading candidate thus far in the field.—Sun.

Easton, Pa., May 19—Patrick Grier, who has made nine attempts to suicide, still lives. He was discharged from the hospital yesterday after the sixth attempt by taking laudanum. He was locked in the station house last night. His first attempt was to hang himself to the cell door with a rope made from his shirt, but was discovered. Later he tried to hang himself with his suspenders, then he tied a leather shoestrapping around his neck, but without success.—Sun.
