Owensboro, Ky., May 16-The small sum of \$12. convention of Western Kentucky Democrats held here to day for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Railroad Commissiones closed with a most exciteing clash over the money question. As soon as the nomination was made the convention was turned into a howling crowd of gold and silver cranks, Senator Blackburn, who is making his fight for re election on a free silver platform, led the contest and he was aided by ex Congressman Ellis.
