Offers a Reward of \$200.

The following was published in a recent issue of the Albany Democrat. Mr. B. Nolton, of Marysville, Cal., called at the Democrat office this morning and directed the Democrat to offer a reward of \$200 for information which will lead to the recovery of his wife and children, particularly the children. The case is an interesting one. About ten years ago, Mr. Nolton, then residing in Marion county, was married to a Linn county lady. Six years ago they moved to the vicinity of Marysville, where Mr. Nolton has a big sheep ranch with about 5000 sheep and 2000 lambs. He informs the Democrat that his married life was particularly a happy one. Nearly two years ago Chas McClothing began working for him. Three months ago he discharged him, on account of his drinking. His wife even made the request a number of times. A month later McClothing came back and wanted work again, but was refused. One Sunday morning Mr. Nolton, who has two ranches, went to the other ranch and returned Monday evening. Two hours after he left, his wife, three children and McClothing skipped out for Oregon in a light Studebaker wagon, drawn by two horses branded O, some books and about \$500 in money. Mr. Nolton immediately followed and got track of them once or twice and has chased through Coos county, Yaquina Bay and even Eastern Oregon without avail. It was his opinion that they would come to this county. One would not think, though, that a woman would run away with another man to her former home. The family consists of Mrs. Nolton, with dark hair and eyes, with only three teeth, the others having been extracted recently for the purpose of securing a new set, a girl 9 years of age, a boy 5 and a baby 18 months old. Mr. Nolton will leave for Marysville tonight. Any information leading to the recovery of his children will be rewarded by \$200. Other papers are requested to notice.

Armenian Situation.

A letter from Erzeroum, Turkey in Asia, has been received by Homer A. Canfield from his partner, William L. Sachtleben, the St. Louis wheelman who left here four months ago for Asia Minor to locate and bring to justice, if possible, the murders of Frank Lenz, the Pittsburg cyclist, who lost his life there. Sachtleben writes that he has discovered the identity of the Kurdish chief who planned the killing and the 5 men who helped him commit the deed. The writer states that he arrived at Erzeroum about May 17th, and adds: "Out of quite a number of correspondents who came to Constantinople in an endeavor to reach Erzeroum, it not Bitlis and Moosh near the Sassoun district where the horrible atrocities have taken place, only three

have succeeded in reaching the city, so strict is the watch kept by the Turkish government."

A rehearsal of the incidents of the Sassoun massacre has been obtained from refugees and forwarded from Bitlis for publication in American papers. The report is practically a confirmation of all the details heretofore received and recites cruelties of the most revolting nature.—Stateman.
