Steps Taken to Keep Them on their Reservations.

Judge Rutherford received the following from the office of Indian Affairs at Washington, dated June 3, 1895

Sir: I am in receipt of a communication dated the 11th ultimo, signed by yourself, R. R. Sitz and A. D. Marks, of Harney Co., in which complaint is made that annually during the summer and fall months Indians from the several tribes adjacent to Harney county on reservations enter the said county for the purpose of slaughtering deer and other game solely for their hides, thereby destroying a great quantity of meat which would otherwise be used by the settlers; in addition they pillage the sheep camps and otherwise annoy the settlers; and it is therefore requested, on behalf of the people of the said county, that all Indians under the supervision of the government be restrained from entering Harney county Oregon, during the coming summer, fall and winter months on any pretext whatever.

In reply I have to say that all of the U. S. Indian Agents in charge of the respective Indian reservations in the state of Oregon, with the exception of the Agent of the Klamath Agency, were quite recently advised of the complaints made to this office as to Indians under their charge going off their reservations and committing depredations upon the settlers, slaughtering game etc., and instructed to investigate the matter and if the charges made were found to be true to take such action as might be necessary to prevent, so far as possible, future depredations.

Similar instructions have this day been sent to the U. S. Indian Agent at Klamath Agency.

It is therefore hoped that this action will prevent in the future the evils complained of and relieve the citizens of Harney county from annoyance at the hands of the Indians.

Cuban Insurgents.

Maximo Gomez has attacked Alta Gracia and burned the railroad station and many other houses. The garrison, consisting of 25 soldiers, made an heroic defense losing five killed and having seven wounded. Captain General Martinez DeCampos has proclaimed the province of Puerto Principe under martial law. Colonel Camellas has had several engagements with the insurgents at Pinillipinas, Uetas Costas, Passo and Songo Dabacas, routing the insurgents, who had several killed. He also captured a quantity of arms and ammunition. The troops had one killed and 12 wounded.

The Franco-Russian Alliance.

It is positively stated that M. Hanotaux's recent speech referring to the Franco-Russian alliance has led to the interchange of official dispatches between the imperial chancellery and Prince Lobanoff-Rostovsky. The Russian minister

for foreign affairs opened the correspondence with an intimation to the effect that no written treaty of alliance existed between France and his country. As if to give more point to this communication, the czar has given strict orders that the officers and men of his squadron at Kiel shall not attempt to make any demonstrations indicating sympathy with the French sailors.—Sun.

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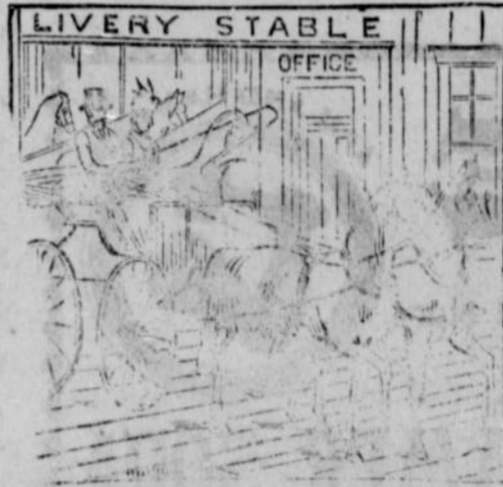
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
