Two weeks ago we published the kind act of Father Bowen and wife taking in a poor traveling man who was sick and without money. In company with this man was another emigrant by the name of Fitzgerald and his wife. Mrs. Fitzgerald stopped at Mrs. Bowens a few days and then came here and stopped with the family of Mr. Geo. Young, Mrs. Young needing her help. A day or two after being employed by Mrs. Young, Mr. Fitzgerald, the husband of the woman, came after her ostensibly with the intention of going back to Idaho from where they came. They camped on Prater Creek about ten or twelve miles from here, remaining there over night. In the morning Mr. Fitzgerald without ceremony told his wife he could dispense with her and began throwing her things from the wagon a performance in which his wife assisted after seeing his intention. He then drove away leaving her all alone in a strange country away from home and friends to shift for herself. Some one passing the deserted wife sent word to Mrs. Bowen imploring assistance, Mrs. Bowen immediately hitched up a team to a vehicle and went for the poor woman, bringing her home. In a day or two afterward she, Mrs. Fitzgerald, was taken sick and we understand is still very sick with an attack of grip.
