Local News.

—Messrs. Richardson, James, Copeland, Morris and Vickers of Harney and vicinity have been in town in the last week.

—The saw-mill of McKinney and Sparrow, has stopped sawing for the season. But the planer is still running.

—The Grant County News publishes that portions of this county are getting so dry the crickets are digging wells on the desert, and carrying the sand to the surface in tobacco pouches.

—It has been decided in Alabama that if a bachelor puts his arm around the waist of a woman, it is a marriage proposal, consequently if not consummated establishes grounds for a damage suit.

—Pete says there was a "little old log cabin in the lane" but Al declares it is not so, he says "there was nothing behind which they could take shelter except a wire fence and the posts are small and so is the wire."

—Ben and John Jordan were arrested on Beaver Creek, Crook County by Peter Stenger and Ike Winters and brought back here arriving last Saturday. They are now having their preliminary examination.

—I. Jewett came into town yesterday afternoon after Dr. Marsden to go to Silvies Valley to attend to the broken leg of Mr. Canady, who was thrown from a mower in the morning resulting in a broken leg.

—Alma Davis a short time ago, found in the mountains north of Harney an old flint lock rifle gun bearing the date of 1823. And of course the general supposition is it belonged to some one of the Blue Bucket notoriety.

—Prof. J. T. Hevard, Robert Warren and John Merrill, archaeologists of Chicago, who have spent the last three months in Mexico in the wild regions of Cheapas, have discovered two ancient cities, situated in the midst of a forest of hardwood, northwest of the town of Coteapra. The two cities are about eight leagues apart, and must in their populous days, contained 2,000,000 inhabitants.

ANOTHER FIRE AT HARNEY.

Nearly all the business portion of Harney, was destroyed by fire last Saturday night. We understand, but cannot vouch for its correctness, that this fire was the work of an incendiary. L. Woldenberg's store was burnt, together with the contents, an empty school building, Price Withers' dry goods store, and his saloon and all its contents, and the livery stable belonging to Snodgrass. Woldenberg's loss is estimated at \$7,750, insurance \$4500 Price Withers' loss \$4500, insurance \$3000 and the livery stable was worth about \$1000 Total loss \$13,850. Insurance \$7,500.

Mr. Dan Cochran has been hired to teach the term of the school for this year.

Contract For Telephone Poles.

The contract has been let for furnishing the telephone poles for the Vale-Ontario line. Mr. Hon. of the firm of Hon. & Grant, was awarded the contract at \$324, or 90c. per pole.

There are to be 360 poles and Mr. Hon contracts to peel them and set them in the ground ready for the wire at the price above named. The men started for the timber to begin getting out the poles yesterday morning.
